Thank you once again for your fabulous support for the Burns' Night and for the Water Project. Special thanks go to our Piper, Tony Ashford-Brown, to Margaret for the Presentation of the Haggis and to the Pewsey Male Voice Choir for helping to get everyone in the mood with their Scottish traditional songs. Next year, we will be better prepared for such a wonderful turn-out. We are already looking for a larger venue. If anyone knows of anywhere please let me know! The Arts Society – Pewsey Vale March and April lectures.

The March lecture of The Arts Society - Pewsey Vale will take place on Tuesday 4th March at the Bouverie Hall, Pewsey at 2.30pm.

Anne Haworth will speak on From Vincennes to Sevres: The Dawn of the French Royal Porcelain Manufactory.

Sèvres was the most illustrious and innovative porcelain factory in 18th Century France, employing brilliant artisans as painters, modellers, and gilders. Spectacular vases and finely decorated dining services made at Sèvres found their way to the grandest of state rooms and the most intimate of boudoirs in the nearby Palace of Versailles. However, the origins of this most fashionable porcelain factory were very different. Established in 1740 within the old royal Château de Vincennes, the first steps were a struggle between avoiding financial collapse and the desire to develop a suitable porcelain paste which could tolerate the intense heat of the kiln. Encouraged by the patronage of Madame de Pompadour and King Louis XV, these early struggles resulted in the creation of a fine white soft-paste material, a tactile glaze, and brilliant jewel-like background colours such as bleu lapis, and the vibrant bleu céleste, a turquoise pigment which would become one of Sèvres's signature colours. After those early years at Vincennes, by 1756 the workshops moved to Sèvres and so began a new golden age for what would become a royal enterprise.

Anne Haworth was a senior ceramics specialist at Christie's London with more than 20 years experience of working within some of the world's greatest museums and most prestigious art collections. She works as an independent scholar and historian.

The April lecture of The Arts Society - Pewsey Vale will be held on Tuesday 1st April at the Bouverie Hall, Pewsey at 2.30pm.

Harry Venning will speak on The Art of the Cartoonist.

Harry will be tracing the history of his profession with examples from early practitioners like Cruickshank and Hogarth, to more contemporary artists such as Giles and Schulz, bringing events right up to date with cartoons he will draw for us on the day! He can not, however, draw hands or horses!!

Harry Venning has been a professional cartoonist for thirty years, during which time he has provided cartoons for several high profile UK publications (The Guardian, Radio Times). He was awarded UK Strip Cartoonist Of The Year for his Guardian strip Clare In The Community, which he adapted into a Radio 4 sitcom. Harry tours his cartoon workshop around schools, theatres, arts centres, cruise ships and festivals. He is an Honorary Fellow of the English/Creative Writing departments of Aberystwyth University, winner of a Sony Radio Award for Comedy and a former UK Strip Cartoonist Of The Year.

Upavon Priory

Upavon Priory was a small Benedictine establishment located in the village of Upavon, in Wiltshire, England. Its origins can be traced back to the Domesday Book of 1086, which recorded that the Benedictine Abbey of Saint-Wandrille in Normandy held land at Upavon. This suggests that the priory was linked to the wave of Norman influence following the conquest of England in 1066. It is believed that the priory itself was established in the 12th century, as a dependency of the Abbey of Saint-Wandrille, which controlled several such small priories in England.

During the 13th century, the church at Upavon gained increased importance and became a prebend of Salisbury Cathedral. The Abbot of Saint-Wandrille was granted the title of canon at Salisbury, further cementing the priory's religious significance. Additionally, the nearby church at Charlton St. Peter was appropriated to Upavon Priory, providing it with additional resources and influence within the local ecclesiastical structure.

A valuation conducted in 1324 detailed the priory's modest assets, which included livestock, two horses, two beds, three tables, and minimal chapel fittings. Unlike larger and wealthier monastic institutions, Upavon Priory was a small and relatively poor religious house, with limited financial and material resources. The priory's role would have been more localised, serving as a centre of worship and land management for the Abbey of Saint-Wandrille rather than as a major religious powerhouse.

The political and military tensions between England and France in the late 14th century had profound consequences for many such alien priories (those controlled by foreign abbeys). In 1378, during the reign of Richard II, all monks from alien priories were expelled from England due to concerns over their allegiance. As a result, the three resident monks at Upavon were forced to leave, and the priory ceased its religious functions. The lands and properties associated with Upavon Priory were instead used for farming and were effectively absorbed into the local economy.

In 1423, ownership of Upavon Priory and its associated assets was transferred to the Augustinian canons of Ivychurch Priory, located southeast of Salisbury. This transfer ensured that the priory's resources remained under English control, as part of the broader efforts to repurpose former alien priories for the benefit of English monastic institutions. The canons of Ivychurch managed the estate until the Dissolution of the Monasteries in the 16th century, when Henry VIII disbanded monastic institutions across England and confiscated their assets.

Historical records indicate that priors were in place at Upavon between 1262 and 1361, but following its closure, the priory left little physical trace. The last remaining structure associated with it, a barn situated between the church and the River Avon, was demolished in the early 1820s. Today, there are no visible remains of Upavon Priory, though its history is well documented. Its legacy provides insight into the impact of Norman influence, the challenges faced by alien priories, and the transformation of monastic properties during the medieval period.

Dear Villagers


Would you be interested in joining the Parochial Church Electoral Register.

Nurture Nature: March 2025

It's good to see and hear on the Radio and TV more attention being given to Nature and the ever-increasing problems around the world with declining habitats, declining species, many birds and animals worldwide on Red Lists. The Black Hornbill in Borneo for one, due to habitat loss, and that goes for many species the world over.

Headlines such as "Humans to blame for ocean changes" which creates stronger ocean currents and wind direction changes, which are worse for the planet., and one species in eight threatened with extinction by 2032. More frequent storms and droughts are creating mass migration of peoples on all the populated continents. It is reported that we humans are to blame for these changes, no doubt with recent pronouncements from OPEC world leaders these events will get worse.

Scientific studies worldwide are warning about the rising temperatures and scientists internationally are warning that global warming will continue. As readers follow the news worldwide you will draw your own conclusions.

To give two examples of the effects on nature, sycamore trees in this country are being hit by a devastating disease called 'Sooty Bark Blight', and storms such as Storm Darragh and others felled thousands of trees around the British Isles. Devastating fires continue in many countries. Birds and animals worldwide are at great risk. The above has only touched on a minute biodiversity loss.

Still, should you wish to get away from it all here's quite a nice job advert: "Wanted, Ranger for remote island three miles off the West coast of Scotland. Applicants should have a good sense of humour". There has been no full-time human inhabitant since 1843. Over the summer Handa is home to over 100,000 birds, including Fulmars, Guillemots and Kittiwakes, and a smaller number of Puffins and Arctic Skuas. Offshore, whales, seals and dolphins are often seen. There's a caveat to this exciting job advertised by the Scottish Wildlife Trust – that the successful applicants must take with them at least enough food for two weeks minimum. Well, if they run out they could always have a cliff nesting sea bird's egg for tea, Now Now!! - as the inhabitants of Hebridean islanders had as a main source of food in earlier centuries.

Should you be holidaying in Wales this year and have never seen a red squirrel go to Plas Newydd on the wooded shores of Anglesey and you could be lucky. (Note: the writer has only ever seen one red squirrel in the British Isles in a wood at Kingsley Green on the Surrey/Sussex border at the end of the Second World War in 1945.)

Finally, should one have a large nest egg, come into a big inheritance, won the pools (do they still exist?), won a major lottery prize, consider joining Bird Life International's 'Millionaires' Club -The Rare Bird Club, subscription £5,000 per annum! This moneyed Club does great conservation work around the world, especially for rare and declining species, details on the Web.

Lastly, a call to the female of the species, this time of the humankind, for more women to become ringers (no, not wringing necks – ringing bird legs). Details on the BTO website. In conclusion, the Royal Mail is bringing out a special issue on March 11th about Garden Wildlife. Apart from the stamps, the info sheet should be of interest. We must keep encouraging our children and future generations to be Guardians of our planet.
